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

Registration will be available through a Google form and once it is completed and received in the NTPDA office, you will be invoiced through QuickBooks. The Whova app will be available beginning October 19th for those registered to access and an email invite will be sent out at that time. As registrations come in after this date and are processed, invites will continue to be sent.

Renaissance Nashville Hotel is where we will be staying and is a beautiful downtown property within walking distance to so much including the Ryman Auditorium and the Country Music Hall of Fame. Because of the success of the trust, the board voted to cover part of the cost for rooms booked under the NTPDA room block up to 3 nights. Our rate is \$270 per night but with the portion the board voted to cover, your portion will only be \$120 plus taxes per night for up to 3 nights. 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
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Let's Eat!

Headed into the cooler months we're thinking football and family gatherings. Welcome to "Let's Eat" a new section for The Bulletin. In this issue two recipes that will not only look good but taste great. We'll kick things off with . . .



"Hot Pizza Dip"

6 ounces light cream cheese
½ cup of light sour cream
1 teaspoon of oregano
½ cup of pizza sauce
1 cup of shredded Mozzarella cheese
½ cup of shredded Colby cheese
½ cup of grated Parmesan cheese
¼ cup of diced red peppers
¼ cup of diced green peppers
¼ cup of sliced green onions
Whole-wheat crackers or bread sticks

1. Combine cream cheese, sour cream and oregano in a bowl. Stir until smooth. Spread evenly into a small baking dish or quiche pan.

2. Top with pizza sauce, cheeses, peppers and onions.

3. Bake at 350 degrees for 15 minutes, or until cheese is melted. Serve with crackers, breadsticks.

Slow Cooker Beef Stew

2 pounds of beef stew meat
6 carrots peeled and cut to 1-inch chunks
3 russet potatoes, peeled, cut into large chunks
1 medium onion cut into rings
³/₄ cup of frozen peas
1 tablespoon sugar
1 teaspoon salt
1 bay leaf
2 tablespoons of quick-cooking tapioca
³/₄ cup of tomato juice
Parsley to garnish



Place the stew meat, carrot chunks, potato chunks, onion, peas, sugar, salt and bay leaf in the crock of a 3 quart slow cooker.
 Sprinkle with tapioca then pour the tomato juice over the top.
 Cover the slow-cooker and cook for 10 – 12 hours on low heat or 5 – 6 hours on high heat. Remove the bay leaf before serving.

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MARKETING TIP FOR SEPTEMBER Ya Gotta Be There

Not long ago I was sitting with an executive talking marketing their service. When we got to social media efforts, I could tell it was an uncomfortable topic. Mostly because, to put it bluntly, they do an awful job. I know that because, before our meeting, I reviewed their LinkedIn, Twitter, Instagram and Facebook posts. I also checked their engagement.

The best word to describe their efforts is, "sporadic".

Many of you know that I come from a broadcast background. I spent time in both radio and television and during that time I had plenty of opportunities to be sitting in the news room along with the old Associate Press or United Press International teletype machines. Yeah, that's how old I am...

So what were they? The best way to describe them is that they were the news source from those two organizations. They constantly spit out, on paper, the news stories that had happened and, if it was a "hot story" bells would go off to draw our attention to what was coming over "the wire". It was always on...always.

But, here is the key point. They didn't just send out the story once. The news services would send them out several times in an hour...often updating the information...and when that update would happen, bells went off...again. Why several times? Because people get busy and they might have missed the story so it gets repeated again and again.

Social Media is the same thing when done right. Let's take Twitter for an example. If you "Tweet" only once or twice a week very few people will see it so what's the point? Also, if somebody comments on your social media platform... engage. It's social va know.

Here is your Marketing Tip: If you are going to be in the space of social media make sure you are there frequently. Depending on the platform consider posting several times a day. Look, if you need some help in figuring all of this out give me a shout. It won't cost you a dime but I promise you you'll see a difference.

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Shrinkflation – There are several ways a company can increase profit without hiking prices. Simply package less but charge the same or slightly higher. Here's a quick sample:

Doritos – Frito Lay shrank some of their Doritos from 9.75oz to 9.25oz.

Gatorade - They created a new "easy to grasp" bottle which, conveniently reduced the amount of liquid by 14%.

Chicken Nuggets – You can no longer get 10 pieces at Dominos or Burger King now there are only eight...but the same price as ten.

Walmart Great Value Paper Towels – The package dropped from 168 sheets per roll to only 120, while the price stayed the same.


Hershey – The candy company cut down its 18-ounce pack of dark chocolate Kisses by almost two ounces.

General Mills – The cereal giant shrunk its "family size" boxes from 19.3 ounces to 18.1 ounces – a drop of nearly 10%...but charge the same price.

Credit Card Interest Rates - Back in May the average credit card, revolving rate was 16.44%...that, again was in May. As of August 24 that interest rate ballooned to 17.85%....and likely to go higher. And, what's interesting is that consumers in the U.S. are starting to max out their credit cards...careful...friends....careful.

IRS Good News - What? Some good news from the IRS? People who owe late fees on their tax returns just got lucky. The Internal Revenue Service is waiving \$1.2 billion worth of late charges for those whose tax filings were impacted by the pandemic. Late fees can be as high as 25% of a filer's unpaid taxes, and though the tax filing date was extended the past few years, the agency said roughly 1.6 million taxpayers are eligible for refunds and will automatically receive them before September ends.







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
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STAFF NOTES, continued

Finally, membership numbers continue to improve and our outreach is a constant. Also, should you have news for us that we might place in our revamped Bulletin. Please send it along.


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
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Happy Fall Friends!
