

Schools are winding down and it seems like there are graduation ceremonies every day. Pictures of scholarship recipients are oating around and it's great to see them excited about







Two highlights this year will be touring the facilities of the New Holland Haytools Factory and Wengers of Myerstown.

Holland Haytools Factory

website, "The New Holland haytools plant traces its roots to 1895 when a two-man machinery repair shop was founded by master machinist and inventor, Abe Zimmerman. Through the years, New Holland became known as the leader in hay and forage technology, pioneering many rsts following the purchase of Lancaster County farmer Ed Nolt's invention of the rst commercially viable automatic self-tie baler in 1940. Nolt's automatic self-tie baler revolutionized haymaking and put New Holland on the map. Today, the New Holland plant produces 30 different models of round balers, square balers, pull-type forage harvesters and other haytools exported to 45 countries around the world." The New Holland campus size is 341 acres, including 150-acre test farm. The manufacturing facility is 700,000 sq. ft. and 47 million pounds of steel is used each year.

After the tour we will have an early lunch at Shady Maple Smorgasbord. They are known as the largest buffet in the U.S. featuring over 200 feet of deliciously authentic Pennsylvania Dutch cooking. Following lunch, we will walk it off at Kitchen Kettle Village where we will experience Pennsylvania Dutch shopping with 40 local shops in an outdoor village lled with homemade Lancaster County food and products.

On Saturday we will have the opportunity to tour Wengers of Myerstown to see their new 20,000 sq. ft. warehouse and renovated showroom. Jake Walmer said there will be plenty of golf carts/gators for people to drive and look around. The combined warehouses add up to about 100,000 sq. ft. They will be treating everyone at their event space called Creekside on Friday evening for dinner and lunch on Saturday.
